WORK	The project team covered by this research protocol includes Economic Roundtable staff and a consultant, Professor Peter Dreier of Occidental College.
	Purpose of Study:
	Investigate economic outcomes for workers represented by UNITE HERE! who provide food and housing services at the University of Southern California (USC). The project includes analysis of secondary data from the U.S. Census Bureau (no risk to human subjects), as well as a questionnaire survey of workers (minimal risk to human subjects). The questionnaire survey of workers is the reason for this Request for IRB Approval.
	Study Population:
	Approximately 900 food service and housing workers currently employed at the USC main campus.
	Steps that will be carried out with human subjects in this project are as follows:
	Task 1. Analyze Membership Records
	Analyze UNITE HERE Local 11 membership records to obtain all possible information directly available from those records as well as through imputing data using linked records, if needed. This includes age, gender, ethnicity, place of residence, job description, wage level, work schedule, and length of job tenure.

Task 6. Conduct Survey of USC Workers

Conduct an in-depth internet survey of the approximately 900 food service and housing workers at USC. Workers will decide whether to provide informed consent before beginning the survey and will have the option of declining to take the survey. The survey will be conducted by the research team in English and Spanish using an online internet survey platform. UNITE HERE! will support worker engagement with the survey through outreach to and communication with represented workers. The steps for designing and conducting the survey are:

6A. Focus group

Conduct a focus group with a small group of workers convened by UNITE HERE to learn about the experiences, living conditions and concerns of workers that should be addressed through the survey.

6B. Develop survey questions

Develop a set of survey questions about demographic attributes, household composition, employment conditions, housing, homelessness, food security, social safety net benefits, and transportation. Survey questions will be in English and Spanish.

6C. Define survey universe and sampling frame

Using data provided by UNITE HERE, define the survey universe and create a sampling framework. Data from membership records about gender, age, ethnicity, job classification, wage level, place of residence, and job tenure will be used to establish benchmarks for a representative sample of respondents.

6D. Develop and set up website and online survey

Design an online survey platform with secure, password-protected data collection. The survey will be available in English and Spanish.

6E. Conduct a pretest of the survey

Work with UNITE HERE to pretest the online survey with a small sample of workers. Revise questions and website as necessary.

6F. Survey data collection

Work with UNITE HERE to facilitate survey collection. This will include real time data tracking, maintaining the website, and working with UNITE HERE to increase survey participation. Conduct preliminary data analysis and brief stakeholders on initial findings.

6G. Monitor survey responses

Monitor the number and representativeness of survey responses throughout survey collection.

6H. Analyze Survey Data

Analyze data collected using statistical software. Identify key findings within and across worker groups.

	This is a Level II project, research with minimal risk involving human subjects. No direct benefits are likely to accrue to human subjects, although service workers at USC (regardless of whether they participate in the survey) may receive an indirect benefit if the research supports successful organizing by UNITE-HERE Local 11 to improve working conditions and compensation. It is also possible that the findings of this study will benefit other low-wage service workers as UNITE-HERE Local 11 seeks to expand its organizing campaign to other universities and major institutional employers.
	In Task 1, the Economic Roundtable team will analyze UNITE HERE Local 11 membership records report on workers' age, gender, ethnicity, place of residence, job description, wage level, work schedule, and length of job tenure. The team will only report aggregated, descriptive statistics about workers and not reveal any personal identifying information.
	In Task 6, the Economic Roundtable team survey workers who are all members of UNITE-HERE Local 11 and employed at USC as food service and housing workers on the main campus, via online questionnaire in English or Spanish. Aside from the focus group session(s) (Task 6A) and some field testing with UNITE-HERE Local 11 staff and shop stewards employed at the university, the research team will have no contact with survey respondents. UNITE-HERE Local 11 staff plan to support their members' participation in the survey, offering assistance in completing them on workers cell phones, and by sending email reminders complete it. The Economic Roundtable team will provide periodic updates to UNITE-HERE Local 11 staff about the overall response rate during the survey process.
	It is recommended that the IRB review this research project as "Level II" because there is minimal risk to the human subjects. Survey responses collected from workers will be safeguarded in the Economic Roundtable office, and will not be shared with any outside organizations, except in de- identified and aggregated form.
	The remainder of this study poses no greater than minimal risk to human subjects, because the analysis uses publicly-available data form the U.S. Census Bureau and other non-confidential, secondary sources. The final

	report and briefings will present only de-identified data, which are aggregated into summary charts and tables.

	 Economic Conditions (Rent burden, household overcrowding, experiences of homelessness and food insufficiency, reliance on food stamps)
	 Economic Inequality (workers compared to USC administrators, trustees and students)
	 Community Impacts (displacement of affordable housing, gentrification, housing developed by USC for faculty, students, and workers)

	 Profile of Workers (demographics, family size and age, occupation, wage and benefit levels, work schedules and hours, secondary jobs, length of employment)
	 Assessment of Job (pride in work, fair and unbiased treatment and advancement, respect, sexual harassment, adequate and stable work hours)
